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




OPERATIONS BUREAU-MEDICAL

Our jail, like jails and prisons across the country, are not just holding people accused or convicted of crimes. We provide care to meet the needs of persons with a mental illness.




A large number of people coming into the Newport News City Jail are in need of psychotropic medication—drugs that affect a person's mood, behavior, perception, and thoughts. While medications are not a cure for mental illness, they can help manage the symptoms.

Putting someone on a watch lowers the risk of self-harm. Medical personnel also make rounds to ensure an inmate's well-being.



Dental services are provided to inmates. In 2024, 473 inmates received dental care.






SERVICES BUREAU-COURT SECURITY


In 2024, more than 200,000 people visited the three Newport News courthouses without incident.








SERVICES BUREAU-COURT SECURITY

Not everyone facing charges goes right to jail. They receive bond or are issued a summons to show up in court later. If convicted, we use the LiveScan system to get their fingerprints, take their mugshots, and get DNA in some cases. In 2024, more than 800 people were processed for incarceration using this technology.




Another responsibility of the Services Bureau is to try to find relatives of people who have died and their remains have not been claimed. When no next-of-kin is found or when relatives do not want to claim the deceased, we go to court for a judge to approve the dignified disposition of the body.



SERVICES BUREAU-CIVIL ENFORCEMENT


Civil Enforcement deputies spend most of their day out of the office serving papers and taking actions that are ordered by the courts. Among the documents we deliver are summonses, subpoenas, and protective orders. Deputies are also responsible for evictions in conjunction with property managers, levies, and they conduct property auctions from time to time.






Civil deputies connect with families enrolled in our Project Lifesaver program, checking on them and making sure the equipment their loved one wears is working properly. Batteries in the tracking anklets and bracelets are replaced every 30 days. Those bracelets help us find children and adults who wander away so we can return them to their loved ones.





SERVICES BUREAU-TRANSPORTATION

Transportation of inmates falls to the Services Bureau. Deputies move incarcerated persons to and from courts in other cities, to penitentiaries, and take them to medical appointments outside the Jail and Annex. There were more than 2,300 transports in 2024.




A writ is a written order issued by a court commanding a specific incarcerated person be brought to court. Transportation deputies ensure prisoners are moved safely and efficiently, whether by vehicle or airline.



SERVICES BUREAU-TRANSPORTATION

Services deputies also handle Detention Orders, Temporary Detention Orders (TDOs) and extraditions. Extraditions are performed by driving or taking a commercial flight. There were fewer extraditions and more TDOs and detention orders than in previous years.





SERVICES BUREAU—SHERIFF'S WORKFORCE

The Sheriff's Workforce is comprised of deputy sheriffs who oversee and work alongside inmates who have been vetted to work in the community. Crews stay busy all year putting up tents for city events, mowing and edging city streets and right-of-ways, moving furniture and boxes of documents to city storage sites, and coordinating with the city's 311 center to respond to citizen complaints.





The Workforce saved the city more than \$1 million in 2024.






PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS BUREAU-RECRUITING/RETENTION

Professional Standards personnel handle all kinds of investigations.



We are stronger together because our partnerships address important community issues and lead to positive outcomes that benefit everyone.





It is like a small city with hundreds of people who depend on the NNSO for housing, food, medical services,


sanitation, laundry and more.


Deputies working in the jail also provide security to ensure the safety of


JAIL OPERATIONS—CLASSIFICATION

Housing decisions are made through the classification process. In 2024, the main jail and annex held an average of 475 people per month. Once a person is booked, we keep detailed records to determine housing assignments, medical and specials needs and for tracking where inmates are located. That kept the kitchen busy preparing 1,132 meals a month on average.

Our Jail Maintenance division is comprised of deputies and select inmates with skills to get jobs done. That way, we don't have to hire people to do the work.





These jobs, completed by trustees and deputies, included painting, deliveries, moving heavy equipment, floor cleaning, waxing and buffing, and removing and replacing carpeting throughout the Sheriff's Office.

As you can imagine, housing thousands of inmates per year creates a lot of laundry. Staff and trustees clean bedding and clothing in the jail

laundry. Sheriff Morgan also has them clean the bedding used by homeless shelters that operate in winter.





Bags of linens are brought to the jail. We clean them so they can be picked up the next day. This helps prevent the spread of disease in the close quarters of a shelter.
